About Salford District Scouts

Salford District will officially open on 1st October 2025 and replaces the existing Ellesmere and Lowry Districts. This District is located in Greater Manchester West County and will made up of 17 Groups. The District covers the City of Salford. The total membership will be 1172, which includes:

- 142 Squirrel Scouts (4 and 5 year olds)
- 240 Beaver Scouts (6 and 7 year olds)
- 231 Cub Scouts (8 to 10½ year olds)
- 210 Scouts (10½ to 13 year olds)
- 81 Explorer Scouts (14 to 17 year olds)
- 21 Network Members (18 to 24 year olds)
- 247 Adult Volunteers (18+ year olds)

Joining the team isn't just about having all the skills and experience to do the role from day one – Scouts is just as much about us as adults using and developing our own skills as it is about creating opportunities for young people to build Skills for Life.

What would I be doing as District Lead Volunteer?

District Lead Volunteers support other managers, known as Group Lead Volunteers, and other volunteers. Adults at every level need support to ensure that they are motivated, inspired and focused on providing first-class Scouting. A good manager thanks other volunteers for their hard work, and helps to make sure that they feel happy and supported, week after week.

The District Lead Volunteer will also provide direction for the District, and will help others see the bigger Scouting picture through solid leadership. We believe that everyone in management roles within Scouting should adopt an approach that combines the skills of both leadership and management.

Responsible to: County Lead Volunteer

Responsible for: District Leadership Team Leaders, District Team Members, Group Lead Volunteers and other volunteers within the District.

Main Tasks

- Ensure that the District thrives and has the best systems in place to support the Groups, to support all adult volunteers in the District and to develop Scouting in the District
- Provide line management and support to the adults in the District that directly report to you including setting objectives for their work and holding regular reviews and one-to-one meetings.
- Produce a vision for the District and implement a development plan to meet that vision.
- Ensure that Scouting in the District is attractive to young people and adults from all backgrounds in the District.
- Ensure that the District has an adequate team of supported and appropriate adults working effectively together and with others to meet the Scouting needs of the area.
- Ensure that problems within the District are resolved so that excellent Scouting is provided to young people in the District.
- Work with the County Lead Volunteer and other District Lead Volunteers in the County to ensure that Scouting in the County continues to thrive.
- Ensure The Scouts' policies and rules are adhered to and implemented across the District.

Appointment Requirements

Must complete the relevant training within the outlined timescales. It is expected whilst volunteering for this role you will undertake regulated activity and therefore a DBS check and references are required. There is also a required to be eligible to be a Charity Trustee.

What we are looking for?

Skills and Abilities

- Ability to organise, lead and motivate a team of volunteers to get things done.
- Experience of working young people and other adults, and the ability to build and maintain positive professional relationships.
- Ability to communicate well and clearly, orally and in writing.
- Ability to listen to others and provide support and guidance when necessary.
- Can build, maintain and facilitate effective working relationships with a wide range of people.
- Contribute and lead on strategy development and identify practical actions to achieve strategic objectives.
- Can construct and implement long-term plans that improve and expand Scouting offered to young people, and identify training, resources and other needs required to undertake this work.
- Ability to negotiate compromises.
- Plan, manage and monitor your own allocated tasks and those of your team members.
- Ability to use digital technology well, including Microsoft Office, email and other digital online platforms including software to support online meetings such as Zoom or Teams.

Knowledge and Experience

- Experience of leading and managing others from various backgrounds, desirably in a volunteer environment effectively.
- Knowledge and experience of what we do in Scouting to deliver programme to young people.
- Understanding the challenges of the voluntary sector.
- Experience of working with young people and/or community work with adult groups.

Personal Qualities

- An understanding of the needs of adult volunteers and young people in our communities.
- Able to work as part of a team and promote good teamwork.
- Driven in both personal tasks and those which require teamwork.
- Resourceful, energetic, enthusiastic and self-motivated.
- Accept and champion the fundamentals, values and strategic objectives of Scouting.
